SELECT ENTRY ACCELERATED LEARNING (SEAL)

SEAL is a pathway for high-ability students which aims to challenge them and offer them opportunities to grow. Students explore the Victorian Curriculum whilst additionally having opportunities to engage in philosophy, ethics, STEAM and politics. There is an emphasis on collaborative learning with other academically minded students, as well as engagement in higher-order thinking skills, communitybased projects, and inquiry-based learning and leadership opportunities.

Year 7 2024 students are invited to apply for the program as outlined by the Entrance Process.

Entrance Process

- 1. Students enroll at DSC and receive their Welcome Pack.
- 2. Enroll to sit the entrance test via this link: https://compasstix.com/e/rl9bkfja9f
- 3. Students will complete three tests onsite. A writing, reading and numeracy test.
- 4. Students will be shortlisted based on testing results.
- 5. Shortlisted students and parents will be invited to an interview with the school.
- 6. Final 25 students are invited to join the program.





COLLEGE COMMUNICATIONS

Doncaster Secondary College uses a range of tools to communicate information to families.

Compass Parent Portal

An online software package that provides access to important information, such as College Newsfeeds, Booklists, digital resources, Canteen menu, Newsletters & Bulletins.

Following enrolment, parents/guardians will be given their personal user name and password to access Compass via **Quicklinks on the College website**. It is important that you login and become familiar with this facility. Compass Tutorials can be accessed via the Quicklinks section.

The Compass Parent Portal will also enable you to access your child's timetable, email teachers, make appointments for parent/teacher conferences, and access your child's reports.

College Bulletin

Every fortnight, families will receive the College Bulletin via a Compass Newsfeed. The Bulletin acts as a summary of all the key information from each mini-school and aims to assist students and families be organised. Items include key dates, reminders from teachers, links to valuable resources and wellbeing resources.

College Newsletters

Twice a term our College publishes a Newsletter via a Compass Newsfeed and is available on our College website. The Newsletter is longer format document that contains items such as a Principal's update, student achievements, College news, photos, alumni stories, local community notices & more. The publication is designed to be consumed at a leisurely pace and to foster a sense of school pride.

BRING YOUR OWN DEVICE (BYOD)

'Bring Your Own Device' (BYOD) refers to students bringing a personally owned device (Microsoft based Laptop and Netbooks) to school for the purpose of learning.

BYOD is compulsory for students in Years 7, 8, 9 and 10.



Students will use their registered devices to complete in-class activities, check their student portal, collaborate in real time, research for projects, and access websites with curriculumrelated content.

Doncaster Secondary College has selected devices that best meet curriculum and technical requirements. Our College has established the **DSC BYOD Portal** to make purchasing devices and accessing tech support a seemless experience. Please be aware that devices cannot be charged at school due to workplace Occupational Health and Safety guidelines. The College will not take responsibility for loss, theft or damage of the device therefore we recommend that you purchase insurance.

BYOD Office 365 will be provided free of charge by the Department of Education for all students. This will be installed during the first weeks of Term 1. Office 365 includes: Word, PowerPoint, Excel, Outlook, One Note and Publisher.

No printing will be provided at the College.

In line with our College values of Respect, Responsibility, Resilience and Teamwork, we expect all students to use learning technology appropriately. Please refer to the College Policy 'ICT Acceptable Usage Agreement - Students' on our website.





INSTRUMENTAL MUSIC PROGRAM

Classroom Music forms a part of the College curriculum and may be undertaken through to VCE level. Instrumental Music is an extra-curricular activity.

Instrumental Music lessons take place during school hours for half a period (37 mins) on a rotating withdrawal basis. Classes are run in small groups of up to five students. VCE students have individual tuition.

Tuition is offered at the College on a large range of Woodwind (flute, oboe, bassoon, clarinet, bass clarinet saxophone), Brass (trumpet, French horn, trombone, baritone, euphonium, tuba), Percussion (orchestral and drum kit) and String Instruments (violin, viola, cello, double bass, guitar and bass guitar) during school time.

Students who learn an instrument at the College are required to be a member of one of the College ensembles: Wind Symphony, Concert Band, Soundworks (Junior Concert Band), Guitar Ensemble, Chamber Strings, String Orchestra, Stringworks (Junior Orchestra), Vocal Ensemble, Senior Jazz Band, Junior Jazz Band.

The Rock Program is offered to students who play contemporary instruments such as keyboard, electric guitar, drums, bass and vocals.

Rehearsals take place either before or after school.

Additional activities such as concerts, excursions, music camps and interstate/international senior tours form part of the Program.



Our Music levy is \$500 per year (to be confirmed) and this covers weekly instrumental lessons delivered by highly experienced and dedicated music teachers, ensemble rehearsals and ensemble sheet music. The levy is government subsidised which makes it far cheaper than private music lessons.

Instrument hire is \$150 per year regardless of the instrument you play. If we don't have the instrument that you choose, then our instrumental teachers will advise you of the best brands to purchase or great hire-to-buy deals offered by many music stores.

Students who are learning an instrument privately outside the College may participate in College ensembles for a small levy of \$50.

Lessons begin in the first weeks of term one 2024.

All 2024 Year 7 students and their parents/carers are strongly encouraged to attend, even if you have no intention of learning an instrument. After trying an instrument, you may be surprised how much fun it is. Hearing the instruments in person is a totally different experience to watching a video or hearing a recording.

Students will be asked to select their three preferred instruments. Considering suitability and positions available, students will be allocated one of their preferences and they will be informed at Orientation Day on the 12th December.

MOBILE PHONE POLICY

Doncaster Secondary College acknowledges that we live in a technology-rich world where mobile phones are an important communication tool. However, research has found that mobile phones can be disruptive in classrooms and open to misuse at school. Therefore students must not use their mobile phones at the College during school hours, including lunchtime and recess, unless an exception has been granted.

Doncaster Secondary College understands that students may bring a personal mobile phone to school, particularly if they are travelling independently to and from school. Students who choose to bring mobile phones and/or other personal mobile devices to school must have them switched off and stored securely in their respective lockers during school hours.

In the case of an emergency or necessary immediate contact, parents/guardians may reach their child by calling the College office on 9848 4677.

DSC also acknowledges that other mobile devices such as tablets and laptops will be brought to school for educational purposes in line with our Bring Your Own Device (BYOD) policy. These are to be used for educational purposes only unless an exception has been granted. Laptops and tablets are not to be used during recess and lunchtime unless an exception has been granted.

Smart Watches are not prohibited; however, students are strongly encouraged to refrain from using them as communication devices. Air pods and earphones of other kinds are not to be used or seen unless permission has been given by a teacher.

Students who use their mobile phones and/or other mobile device during school hours, will be requested to surrender their device to the Junior School Office for secure storage for the remainder of the day, where the device will be returned to the student at 3.15pm.

Consequences for breaking this policy will be graduated and consistent with restorative practices and may include an afterschool detention that will be issued with 24 hours notice.

BOOKLISTS

All students' learning resources can be ordered through Campion Education (Australia). In November 2023, a Compass Newsfeed will be sent to all enrolled families to advise how and when the booklists are available to be accessed.

The Campion Education site can be accessed via the Quicklinks menu on our College website. New families will need to create an account. A Compass Newsfeed will be sent mid November 2023 which provides a link to access your child's education resources.

Education resources will include items such as novels, language text books & workbooks, a calculator, a dictionary, an atlas, a protractor and digital education eBook bundles. Students will also require stationery which can be purchased from Campion Education or other retailers.

- Science




COLLEGE CONTRIBUTIONS

Staying safe on school bus services


- Always touch ON and OFF with a valid Student Pass or myki card.
- Stand away from the curb when the bus approaches your stop.
- While on the bus, students should remain seated or hold on tightly to the railing. You never know when the bus driver might need to brake suddenly.
- Never cross the road in front or behind the bus. Wait for the bus to depart before crossing the road.

STATE SCHOOLS RELIEF

2024 Year 7 CSEF Uniform Package

Through government funding the Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund (CSEF) was established to provide payments for eligible students to attend camps, sports days and excursions. State Schools' Relief works with the government to provide packages to families eligible to receive this funding and can assist families facing financial disadvantage with school uniforms, footwear and other essential educational resources.
